Introduction

The public interest test is based on the principle that licensed premises must operate within the interests of the local community. The Butterworth's Australian Legal Dictionary defines the term "public interest" as:

"an interest in common to the public at large or a significant portion of the public and which may, or may not involve the personal or propriety rights of individual people"

The public interest provisions enable the licensing authority to consider a broad range of issues specific to each licence or permit application, and flexibility exists to assess each individual application on its merits.

Each community is different and has individual characteristics. Similarly, each licensee's business or proposed manner of trade is unique to the particular premises. A Public Interest Assessment (PIA) outlines how the premises/proposed premises will impact the community and provide an outline of how the applicant will manage any impact.

Section 31 of the *Liquor Control Act 1988* ('the Act') provides the licensing authority with the discretion to grant licences.

Under section 33(1) *'the licensing authority has an absolute discretion to grant or refuse an application on any grounds, or for any reason, that the licensing authority considers in the public interest.'*

In considering the public interest, the licensing authority will take into account the objects of the Act as provided in section 5 and the matters set out in section 38(4).

In this regard, applicants will be required to lodge a PIA with the application.

Legislative Provisions

The primary objects of the Act as set out in section 5 are:

- a) to regulate the sale, supply and consumption of liquor;
- b) to minimise harm or ill-health caused to people, or any group of people, due to the use of liquor; and
- c) to cater for the requirements of consumers for liquor and related services, with regard to the proper development of the liquor industry, the tourism industry and other hospitality industries in the State.

The secondary objects of the Act are:

- a) to facilitate the use and development of licensed facilities, including their use and development for the performance of live original music, reflecting the diversity of the requirements of consumers in the State;
- b) to provide adequate controls over, and over the persons directly or indirectly involved in, the sale, disposal and consumption of liquor; and
- c) to provide a flexible system, with as little formality or technicality as may be practicable, for the administration of this Act.
- d) to encourage responsible attitudes and practices towards the promotion, sale, supply, service and consumption of liquor that are consistent with the interests of the community.

Section 38(4) of the Act provides that the matters the licensing authority may have regard to in determining whether the granting of an application is in the public interest include:

- a) the harm or ill-health that might be caused to people, or any group of people, due to the use of liquor;
- b) whether the amenity, quiet or good order of the locality in which the licensed premises or proposed licensed premises are, or are to be, situated might in some manner be lessened;
- c) whether offence, annoyance, disturbance or inconvenience might be caused to people who reside or work in the vicinity of the licensed premises or proposed licensed premises;
- ca) any effect the granting of the application might have in relation to tourism, or community or cultural matters; and
- d) any other prescribed matter. (Please note: there are no prescribed requirements at this time).

The licensing authority has discretion to impose conditions on the licence or permit that has regard to the public interest, the objects of the Act and the information provided in the applicant's PIA submission. Conditions may also be imposed based on the content of the PIA submission.

In considering the public interest, applicants should demonstrate the positive aspects of their application including the social, economic and health impacts. It is not sufficient for applicants to merely demonstrate that the grant of the application will not have any negative impact.

Locality

As part of a PIA submission, applicants must provide details regarding the community in the vicinity of the licensed premises (or proposed licensed premises) and any amenity issues in the locality.

The term 'locality' in this instance refers to the area surrounding the proposed licensed premises. This locality will be the area most likely to be affected by the granting of an application in relation to amenity issues.

However, in terms of potential harm or ill-health impacts on the community an applicant may need to consider a wider geographic area depending on the intended nature of the business.

In this regard, in terms of addressing objects 5(1)(b) and 5(1)(c) of the Act, an applicant may need to consider an area which is much broader than the 'locality' used for consideration of amenity issues. For example, an application for a destination liquor store, which may draw its clientele from a large geographic area, would need to address 5(1)(b) and 5(1)(c) of the Act in a much broader context. The onus is on the applicant to satisfy the licensing authority that the grant of the application is in the public interest and provide relevant evidence and submissions to discharge this onus. An applicant should address all relevant considerations under the Act, bearing in mind all the circumstances and unique features of its particular application.

Licensing Authority's Expectations for a PIA

Completing the PIA should be part of an applicant's business planning. A PIA assists the licensing authority in assessing the impact of the application, if granted, on the community, including existing services and amenity. It is also a valuable document for informing the community about the proposed manner of trade. It is important to note that there is no requirement in the Act for PIAs to be prepared by legal counsel or industry consultants. Applicants can complete their own PIA by taking a common-sense approach after liaising with the relevant key stakeholders and interest groups in the community.

Evidence to support an application being in the public interest should include, but is not limited to petitions; survey results; and letters of support and statements of consumers having a requirement for the type of liquor to be sold and supplied under the licence sought.

It is important to note, however, that because each community is different, the level of detail required in a PIA will be different for individual applications. The required level of detail is subject to the complexity of the application and the impact the premises/proposed premises will have on the surrounding community.

The following questions have been developed to guide applicants through the PIA process and highlight the areas which should be considered.

2.1 What facilities and services will be provided by the proposed premises?

The proposed premises will consist of a late-night café, with an outdoor al-fresco smoking (hookah) area. The café component of the premises will also incorporate the sale of alcohol for patrons.

Shisha Bar and Café/Restaurant.

2.3 What is the target client base?

The premises will allow both a service and location for persons to smoke tobacco socially, while providing a dining option (including late nights) for patrons passing by on Albany Highway. With regards to specific target client bases, Hookah is a product most used by cultures and populations local to Asia, the Middle East and parts of Africa. It is expected that a large portion of the target market will be patrons with this cultural background, as well as any social smokers who may want to utilise the services on offer.

2.4 Will the premises be distinguished by any particular theme or decor?

The proposed premises is a shisha lounge. Therefore, there will be décor characteristic of a typical hookah lounge (e.g. sofas). The owners are also of Ethiopian-origin, so it is anticipated that the premises will ultimately reflect themes pertaining to their Ethiopian heritage.

Part 3 – Public Interest – section 38(2)**3.1 Why is the grant of a licence in the public interest and how will it benefit the community?**

The proposed premises will provide a late-night dining and entertainment option for people within the immediate locality and beyond. The proposed premises adds to the emerging food, drink and entertainment options on Albany Highway south of Victoria Park, while providing a place for people in the community to meet and socialise after work or a night out.

The immediate locality, Bentley, is a mixed-class suburb, and according to the 2016 Census, there were 8,782 people in Bentley of which 33.6% of people were born in Australia. In 2001, the ABS reported that about 3% of Bentley's population were Aboriginal. There may be an itinerant population given the proximity of Bentley Hospital and Curtin University to the premises. The surrounding locality is made up of the following suburbs; Wilson, St James, Cannington, East Victoria Park, Welshpool and Queens Park. According to the 2016 Census, there are a total of 33,936 People residing in these areas, with on average 43.14% of them being Australian. Throughout these Suburbs, the 2016 Census has reported an Aboriginal population of approximately 1.58%. The identifiable at risk groups in this locality include the following:

- a) The Aboriginal population in this locality
- b) Children, due to the composition of family types in the locality
- c) Migrant groups, as more than half of the population in this locality are not from Australia, with a large majority of these migrant groups originating from non-English speaking countries.

4.2 What are the social health indicators for the locality? ²

Upon researching the sources in footnote two, no specific information or statistics were found relating to alcohol related crime or hospital admissions. With regards to general crime statistics for the area, the locality and immediate surrounds are summarised as follows:

- a) Bentley: 2019/20 1690 offences, lower than the 5-year average of 1754 offences
- b) Wilson: 2019/20 484 offences, slightly lower than 5-year average of 494 offences
- c) St James: 2019/20 789 offences, lower than 5 year average of 944 offences
- d) Cannington: 2019/20 2,300 offences, slightly higher than 5 year average of 2215 offences
- e) East Victoria Park 2019/20 1632 offences, lower than 5-year average of 1816 offences

¹ In regard to 'at risk' groups and sub-communities, these have been identified under the *Drug and Alcohol Interagency Framework for Western Australia 2011-2015* and may include: children and young people; aboriginal people and communities; people from regional, rural and remote communities; families; migrant groups from non-English speaking countries; people in low socio-economic areas; mining communities or communities with a high number of itinerant workers; and/or communities that experience high tourist numbers.

² In regard to social health indicators, these may include (but are not limited to) the:

- incidence of alcohol related crime in the area. (Data may be reported by local Police, the Australian Institute of Criminology or may be provided by the Office of Crime Prevention); and

f) Queens Park: 655 offences, slightly higher than 5-year average of 633 offences.

Overall in the locality, it was reported that in 2019/20 7,550 crimes were reported. This is lower than the 5-year average for the whole locality, which is recorded at 7,856 offences.

Ensure any patrons purchasing alcohol on the premise must provide a valid ID, approved by the State Government and follow all other liquor licensing requirements. All these obligations and commitments are set out in the 'Harm Minimisation Documentation' for Solemiza Café.

These are set out in Section 3.2, particularly in respect to the obligations of the manager after midnight:

- i) To monitor the behaviour of any particular patron or group;
- ii) To be extra vigilant with the responsible service of alcohol;
- iii) To encourage all patrons consuming alcohol to also order food;
- iv) To ensure the quiet and orderly departure of any patrons; and
- v) To ensure there is no loitering of patrons outside after they have exited the premises.

The proposed premises is located in a commercial zone, with light-industrial uses predominant on Albany Highway and the immediate locality to the south and east. Residential development is located to the west. Bentley is a suburb characterised by a multicultural and high overseas student population, many of whom are studying at the nearby Curtin University and Canning College.

Bentley is also amid large-scale urban regeneration projects. These projects are gradually altering the suburb's demographic from its current population base.

5.2 How will the proposed premises integrate with the amenity of the locality (both positively and negatively)?

As per the planning approval, the premises has developed strategies to contain noise to nearby residential properties. These include no amplified music to be played after 10pm and airlock doors to be closed at all times. The premises also positively contributes to the amenity by providing a late-night entertainment and dining option for local residents and surrounding businesses.

The premises has received approval for a change of use (site was previously a karaoke bar) with the City. Premises to Perth City and Thornlie via Carousel Shopping Centre.

As per the planning approval with the City of Canning, there are 7 car bays to the rear of site. The

adjoining landowner has also provided consent to use their 7 parking bays for after-hours parking

after 6pm, meaning that there are 14 available parking bays during the anticipated peak business

periods. A disabled parking bay is also provided at the front on Albany Highway.

5.9 What is the contribution of the proposed premises to the streetscape and atmosphere of the area?

The proposed premises seeks to mitigate noise onto the streetscape given its late night trading hours thus it will not have a primary role in contributing to the atmosphere of the area. The premises is operating out of an existing building, with minimal signage, and the operations of the business do not alter the streetscape of the area.,

5.10 What is the potential impact of the proposed premises on the level of noise and anti-social activities in the locality, and the management strategies to minimise this impact?

A noise management plan has been developed and conditionally approved by the City of Canning, to mitigate both impacts on the locality (see attached). Noise control measures are specifically identified in Section 4.1.

As also outlined in Section 3.2 of the Harm Minimisation Documentation, residents of houses and businesses within the vicinity of the licensed restaurant Premises should not have their peace and quiet unduly disturbed by noise from the Premises or the behaviour of patrons as they leave the Premises. To facilitate these objectives:

- Management will ensure that the rear air lock doors will operate at all times to ensure that noise or music will not escape the premises and will not cause disturbance.
- Management will promote and encourage amongst patrons a respect for the amenity of the neighbourhood in which the Solemiza Cafe is situated, and the rights of residents not to be unduly disturbed by patrons' behaviour on or off the Premises. This will be reinforced late at night and especially so after midnight.
- Staff will regularly collect all empty glasses and bottles throughout the premises.
- Management will encourage patrons when leaving the premises to leave in an orderly manner respectful of the amenity of the locality. This will be reinforced late at night

and especially so after midnight.

- During trading after midnight, the highest priorities and responsibilities for the on-site manager will be to:
 - vi) To monitor the behaviour of any particular patron or group;
 - vii) To be extra vigilant with the responsible service of alcohol;
 - viii) To encourage all patrons consuming alcohol to also order food;
 - ix) To ensure the quiet and orderly departure of any patrons; and
 - x) To ensure there is no loitering of patrons outside after they have exited the premises.

5.11 What is the potential impact of the proposed premises on vandalism, litter, criminal acts? (especially violent crimes including domestic violence). This may include improvements in the passive and active security of the area.

It is not anticipated that the proposed premises will not encourage nor contribute to vandalism or criminal activity within the area, as the predominant business model for the site is for the sale of food and tobacco smoke (shisha). Alcohol is considered complimentary and pertains a minor role for the enjoyment of both products.

- Maximum accommodation number of 36 patrons (as per the planning approval)

 - It will not be specifically marketed to a young demographic but all age groups;
 - Patronage is largely (but not exclusively) for the Ethiopian community in the metropolitan area. In Ethiopian culture excess consumption of alcohol is frowned upon;
 - the venue is not large;
 - the ambience of the Solemiza Cafe will be on socialisation in café setting, not exclusively drinking. The kitchen will remain during all trading hours, including after midnight; and
 - Many of the patrons expected after midnight will be shift-workers ending or commencing their shifts (e.g. gig economy workers such as tax drivers, etc).
